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OPENING CEREMONY





Although virtual, the delegates at this year's opening ceremony showed the same enthusiasm as a physical MUN when the gavel came down, declaring the conference open.









What the committee has in store for us tomorrow, we couldn't dream of predicting.








DOWE STAN KURDISTAN?


" Why do you want to be like Hitler? " said the delegate of DPRK to the delegate of Turkey boldly accusing them of dividing the nation into two states.






Our business is our business. none of your business⁹⁹





1st August 1965: It has been a week since the commencement of operation Gibraltar. Strong points were made by Indians and Pakistanis in the SSL. Musa Khan, Ayub Khan and Bhaktiyar Rana argued that Muslims were being treated unequally and cruelly in Kashmir while Lal Bahadur Shastri and Lt. Gen. Pat Dunn both bluntly upheld that Pakistan need not meddle with affairs that are not their own. Seems like the 'josh' was high from the very beginning.







In a shocking turn of events, the committee was hit with a crisis! Operation Gibraltar was not able to fulfil its purpose so 30,000 Pakistani troops entered Kashmir and terrorised Kashmiris present there, the irony of which was later pointed out by General Harbaksh Singh. Indian warships have sunk the destroyers near Vishakhapatnam and Dwarka. Pakistani troops in Kashmir were doubled while hostages were beheaded and civilians shot with the death count rising rapidly from 500.

Day 1 of ICC ended with delegates proposing peaceful reparations (and voicing their mutual agreement that the Chair's cake looked too irresistible).



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
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
